September 2012

Invitations went out through the web, email, and the local press to teachers, parents, and wider community to join the committee. Committee was formed.

October 2012

First committee meeting was held on October 23rd from 4:00 – 7:00 pm. Additional 3-hour meetings scheduled.

A new 'Mission Statement' was drafted.

November 2012

A community-wide satisfaction survey was posted on the web; a staff survey was posted; a survey of students in grades 2, 4, and 6 was completed in the computer labs. Committee researched and analyzed the strategic planning process. The mission statement was reviewed and revised.

January 2013

Mission statement was adopted by our committee. Committee began analyzing Orange's data and discussing the findings. Data was grouped into areas of study. Committee began analyzing other districts' strategic plans.

February 2013

Data analysis and further discussion revealed focus areas and the beginnings of goals. A format was chosen. A draft began to take shape.

March 2013

Mission Statement was presented to the Board of Education for a first reading. The rough draft of the 'Working Together We Grow' began to take shape.

April 2013

Drafting and revising took place. New Mission Statement was adopted by the Board of Education.

May 2013

The final draft of the plan was presented to the Board of Education for a first reading.

June 2013

Board of Education adopted 'Working Together We Grow' as its 3-year strategic plan.



OUR DATA STUDY

Our Survey, titled 'Strategic Planning Survey,' was advertised in the local presses, advertised on the web, and emailed to organizations, such as the Chamber of Commerce. We posted it at the library and in a large print version. The on-line survey was open for 5 weeks.


- 460 people responded.
- 75% were community members with one or more children in the schools.
- 67% had been residents of Orange for 8 or more years.
- There were 86 data points and 6 comments boxes throughout the survey.
- Questions included school environments, communications, our attention to health and wellness, academic achievement, the success of programs, and the relative importance of the items we were assessing. For example:
 - 44% felt we were 'average or above' at 'providing programs for students who were academically gifted.'
 - 86% indicated that 'providing programs for students who were academically gifted' was 'extremely important' or 'somewhat more important than other items.'
- There were 593 write-in comments.





CURRICULUM AND INSTRUCTION

GOAL 1: TRANSITIONS

Investigate opportunities to better prepare students and their families for the transitions between schools.

 ${\mathcal D}$ evelop programming for decision-making, time-management, and Internet and social media safety.

 ${\it I}$ nvestigate full-day Kindergarten.

UNDERLYING CONSIDERATIONS:

- Our children and their parents are best prepared for the transitions between schools?
- Our children are prepared for each new step?
- Our Kindergarten students transition to Grade 1 knowing their individual academic and social strengths?
- Our Grade 6 students arrive at Amity Middle School Orange with the right skill set for their academics, time management, and organization?
- Our students are 'cyber smart'?
- Our children are strong decision-makers?





GOAL 2: DIFFERENTIATION

Complete a district-wide, Kindergarten – Grade 6 homework study, including summer assignments.

 $m{J}$ nvestigate the Learning Enrichment Activities Program (LEAP), including the effectiveness of screening, staffing, and time.

 $m{J}$ nvestigate a summer school program appropriate for all students.

UNDERLYING CONSIDERATIONS:

- We are meeting every child's individual needs?
- We differentiate for our children who are excelling?
- Homework will be equally challenging for all students?
- Our students understand the relevance of their homework?
- Summer homework activities maintain students' skills and their interests?
- More students benefit from summer school?





GOAL 3: ALIGNMENT OF CURRICULUM & INSTRUCTION

Znsure the curriculum, materials, supplies, textbooks, and classroom instruction are aligned school-to-school and grade-to-grade.

 $m{J}$ nvestigate opportunities for streamlining, such as for grade reconfiguration and looping.

Expand and align the 21st Century program's before-and-after school curriculum and instruction across the district, including academic clubs and 'Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math' (STEM) activities.

- Students in the same grade receive the same *curriculum* classroom-to-classroom and across the district?
- We implement the same *instructional* models classroom-to-classroom and across the district?
- We provide equal access to quality materials and technology?
- All students become critical thinkers and creative problem-solvers?
- These same principles are extended to our 21st Century program?



SAFE AND SECURE SCHOOLS

GOAL 1: BULLY-FREE ENVIRONMENTS

Complete and publish the Safe Schools Plans.

- All children feel safe and know they are valued?
- Our school communities are sensitive to diversity in all forms?





GOAL 2: SAFETY AND SECURITY POLICIES

UNDERLYING CONSIDERATIONS:

- Our schools are consistently well-supervised and monitored?
- We certify that visitors and volunteers are consistently and appropriately screened?
- Steps are taken to improve parking lot and playground safety?
- Additional security measures are implemented as new security information becomes known?





GOAL 1: HEALTHY FOODS

 $m{\mathcal{E}}$ nsure the food sold and offered to children in school meets health and safety standards.

 ${m I}$ nvestigate healthy alternatives to food-based celebrations and rewards.

UNDERLYING CONSIDERATIONS:

- Policies and procedures protect our children with food allergies?
- The food we provide our children meets health and safety standards?
- The food distributed to children in classrooms, coming from outside the schools, is safe and healthy?
- Our lunch menu options are healthy and appealing to our children?
- We are teaching our children to lead healthier lifestyles?





GOAL 2: HEALTHY LIVING CURRICULUM

 \mathcal{W} ork within the limits of the school day to investigate additional opportunities for children to engage in structured exercise.

 $m{J}$ ncorporate principles of healthy living into the physical education curriculum.

UNDERLYING CONSIDERATIONS:

- Our students celebrate events and are rewarded for their successes with healthy alternatives to food offerings?
- More opportunities for physical activity?
- Our curriculum includes healthy life-style basics, such as drinking water, wearing protective gear, and using sunscreen?
- Our students will develop the skills needed to improve their ability to cope with stress?

GOAL 1: THE DISTRICT WEBPAGE
